Celtic Prayer Circle: Bealtaine, May 1, 2021



We celebrate the festival of Bealtaine (sometimes spelled Beltane), half-way between the Spring Equinox and Summer Solstice, the movement from the dark half to the light half of the year, from the inner to the active. The name is said to derive from Old Irish, meaning "bright fire." It is the season of the rising sun and warming air, the greening, unfurling and blossoming of flora.

The most important aspect of the celebration was the lighting of at least one, often two, and sometimes several huge bonfires. The flames, smoke and ashes were deemed sacred. Both people and cattle would walk around the bonfire or between two bonfires, sometimes even jumping over flames, to gain protection, health, and wealth.

Our Celtic Prayer Circle "gathered remotely" invites us to hold all people, all creatures and Earth in prayer. This prayer invites us to listen for what needs purification and protection so that new life may bloom in us and in our world.

Creating your prayer space

The earth is lush and green as new grass and trees return to life after a winter of dormancy. Use lots of greens, as well as bright spring colors -- the yellow of the daffodils, forsythia; the purples of the lilac; the blue of a spring sky or a robin's egg. Decorate with any or all of

these colors in your cloth and candles, or colored ribbons. Include a vessel with water. Add some early spring flowers.

Light your candle and bless yourself with the water.

Opening Prayer

Pulse of all life
Beat through all I am and all I do this day.
Beat through my feet that I may walk in awareness of earth.
Beat through my thighs that I might go the extra mile for a fellow-traveler.
Beat through my groin that I might cherish the darkness and joy that stirs there.
Beat through my hands that I might touch with awe all you have created.
Beat through my heart that I might better know the connectedness of every living thing.
Beat through my body that I might respect what I take for granted.
Pulse of all life, beat through your world and myself as part of it, as I set forth this day.
